Enhancing our Professional Engineer's Image. One of my missions as Chair is to

promote the professional image of engineers at the chapter level. Two things were done: a) Presenting P.Eng. certificates at upscale venues, such as hotels or golf clubs, b) Making the new license recipients feel proud at the ceremony and their engineering profession. I invited representatives of consulting engineering firms to be the guest speakers at our Dinner and Licence Presentation ceremonies, which they, in return, help sponsor. Mentorship Program at Ryerson University. As part of the education outreach to postsecondary schools, a mentorship initiative was developed with Ryerson University engineering students. A kick-off ceremony was held on November 8 at the Radisson Hotel Markham to launch a mentorship program for York Chapter engineers to work with Ryerson engineering faculty as mentors or Technical Advisors on the Capstone Design courses which 4th year students have to complete before graduation. At the ceremony, Dr. Boctor, Dean of Faculty of Engineering, Architecture and Science presented the "Letter of Appointment" from Ryerson University to each mentor. 

Call For Executive Nominations, Annual General Meeting

The Nominating Committee of the York Chapter is accepting nominations for the Chapter Directorate. The chapter executives are volunteer members with no remuneration, who donate time and effort to participate in the operations and functions of the chapter. The elected executives are required to attend monthly meetings, and participate in certain events. Additional time commitment will vary upon the particular role of each position. Pertinent sections of the Chapter by-laws are in <u>Article 4</u>:

- 1. The Directorate shall be not less than six members and not more than 12 members. A quorum shall be five.
- 2. A nominating committee comprised of one member of the current directorate and two members at large shall be appointed by the current executive. A notice shall be sent annually to all members requesting nominations for the directorate. The nominations must be received by the committee two weeks prior to the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Nominations must bear the signature of two nominators and the nominee, who must be a member of the chapter.
- 3. A slate of candidates, including all those properly nominated, shall be proposed by the Nominating Committee for presentation at the AGM.

- 4. The directorate shall be elected at the AGM from the proposed slate of candidates.
- 5. The directorate will meet immediately after the AGM to elect the officers from its members.
- 6. The officers shall be Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer.
- The immediate Past Chair shall be an officer ex-officio. The office of Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

All nominations must be received by the committee two weeks prior to the Annual General Meeting (AGM), at the address below by February 2, 2007. All York members are encouraged to attend and partake in the election process.

Mentorship Program

hapter Chair, Edward Poon, P.Eng., approached Dr. Boctor, P.Eng. Dean of Faculty of Engineering, Architecture and Science of Ryerson University in April 2006 to introduce the mentorship initiative. The initiative will have professional engineers from York Chapter working with Ryerson engineering faculty to provide technical advice and guidance on the Capstone Design courses for the final year students. Practicing engineers will share their real life experience with the students and become resources to professors and students in completing their design projects. The idea was well received by Ryerson.

n open letter from the Chair was sent to all chapter members on August 3, 2006, introducing this mentorship initiative and recruiting volunteers to support a pilot program. The responses from the chapter members were overwhelming. A total of 15 engineers with experience in Civil, Mechanical or Aerospace engineering came forward to be mentors (technical advisors) for the 2006-07 pilot program. The Mentorship Program was launched on November 8, 2006 at the Radisson Hotel Markham. All mentors received a Letter of Appointment from Dr. Boctor of Ryerson University. For the initial phase of the program, the majority of consultation will occur between January and April 2007. Each mentor is expected to commit approximately 2 to 3 hours a week for a total of 24 hours for this program. This will include meeting the students, guiding their design work, and attending their project presentation. Upon successful completion, formal recognition with a Certificate of Appreciation issued by Ryerson University will be awarded to the mentors in June 2007.

V*i*th experience obtained from the pilot program, we hope to V extend the initiative to include Electrical, Computer, and Chemical engineering and other specialized departments in September 2007, which involves laboratory work in additional to design efforts. ur Education Committee has emphasized the importance of our Engineer-In-the-Classroom (EIC) program. The EIC program provides engineering expertise and knowledge to primary and secondary mathematics and science teachers to help them illustrate specific topics in their classrooms. Once the teachers identify topics requiring additional information, they contact our committee through the Board Consultants, who are part of our team. The committee identifies the volunteer Engineer meeting the required experience and verifies availability and interest.

With the help of the PEO Education Committee, we have developed a brochure to promote the program among schools and teachers in the region. The brochure was distributed to all schools and resulted in increased interest amongst the teachers. To respond to this demand we have promoted the program in various ways to York Chapter Engineers to get more volunteers.
