Councillor's Corner Sustaining PEO Chapters

In my opinion, PEO East Central chapters have problems with inadequate funding. In PEO today, I feel that the chapter system is confronted with ever increasing downloading of regulatory programs from PEO. However, chapter funding may not be adequately adjusted to make such downloading sustainable.

At the East Central Region Congress on September 25, 2007, our chapter chairs and vice chairs reached consensus on the following issues:

1. Need for an equitable chapter funding model that reflects the needs in our chapter business plans:

2. Need for a revised Business Plan Expense Guideline, because the current guideline is outdated and out of touch; and

3. Chapters are fed up with their "poverty," which is affecting morale.

In order to address the above issues, the East Central Region made the following two petitions by means of presentations to the Regional Councillors Committee (RCC) meeting on September 27, 2007.

Matthew Xie, P.Eng., York Chapter Chair, made a presentation called "A Fair Funding Model for PEO Chapters" to the RCC. He explained: 1. the perceived problems of the current chapter funding model, 2. recommendation of a new funding model, and 3. highlights of the York Chapter's 2008 business plan.

I, acting as the Senior East Central Region Councillor, made a presentation called "Allotment for Special Needs 2008" to the RCC. I argued: 1. that the East Central Region has special needs, 2. chapter allotments should be merit-based and activities-based, and 3. requested accommodation with additional funding for our region.

Even though the outcome of the above two petitions would not increase funding for 2008, Even the Regional Councillors Committee has established a Chapter Business Plan Model Subcommittee to study a better funding model for 2009. This subcommittee would be grateful for input from the overall membership on this study.

We all share a common goal of making PEO program downloading sustainable. Every step that each of us can take to make chapter funding more equitable and realistic will be a collective step forward in the right direction. York University Mentorship Program

The objective of the York University Mentorship Program is to nominate PEO York Chapter P.Eng. members as advisors and resources to York University professors to guide the graduating year engineering students to develop and complete their final engineering design project, which is part of the course curriculum before graduation. The mentors will provide practical advice, technical consulting and project management skills to the students. After months of preparation and working with a selected group of York chapter P.Eng. members, the mentorship program is now well underway with nine mentors and six engineering student teams. All of the student teams have met and consulted with their mentors regarding the functional design, project plan and final presentation.

Some of the interesting projects include a wireless activation robot, temperature adjustment garment and microsatellite payload radiator. Ryerson University Mentorship Program

The York Chapter–Ryerson University Mentorship Program entered its second year. With experiences from our pilot program, the mentorship program for the Civil Engineering Department kicked off this September for the 2007-2008 academic year. Three of the 11 mentors for the Civil Engineering Department are volunteers from the York Chapter. Mentors have been guiding students on their final year design project since the start of the school year. The student groups are required to complete diagnostic analyses and develop feasible design solutions, including cost estimates and project schedule in the fall semester. Detailed design, specifications and construction drawings will be carried out in the spring semester. Being a mentor myself this year, I am privileged to work with the faculty and a group of five students on a project I "created." It has been great learning experiences for both of the students and mentor engineers.

Meetings were held with faculty members of the Mechanical and Industrial Engineering Department and Aerospace Engineering Department to identify project needs and titles. Our project coordinators will begin matching student projects with mentors in December for project start in January 2008. We are looking forward to another exciting year with mentoring Ryerson engineering students.

Call for Nominations

The nominating committee of the York Chapter PEO is accepting nom $oldsymbol{1}$ inations for the Chapter Directorate. The chapter executives are volunteer members with no renuneration, who donate time and effort to participate in the operations and functions of the chapter..

Article 4 of the Chapter by-laws states:

- 1. The Directorate shall be not less than six members and not more than twelve members. A quorum shall be five.
- 2.A nominating committee comprised of one member of the current direc torate and two members at large shall be appointed by the current execu tive. A notice shall be sent annually to all members requesting nomina tions for the directorate. The nominations must be received by the com mittee two weeks prior to the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Nominations must bear the signature of two nominators and the nominee. A nominee must be a member of the chapter.
- 3. A slate of candidates including all those properly nominated shall be pro proposed by the nominating committee for presentation at the AGM.
- 4. The directorate shall be elected at the AGM from the proposed slate of candidates.
- 5. The directorate will meet immediately after AGM to elect the officers from its members.
